

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ANTONIA VELAZQUEZ (President, APAC)

Toni was born in Mexico, where she began her passion for painting. She immigrated to Calgary in 2015 with her family. While the first years in Canada were very difficult, Toni found a group of porcelain artists at the Confederation Park 55+ Centre. It was there that Toni became part of a wonderful circle of friends that helped her adapt to a life in Canada. Toni has been an invaluable member of APAC for about five years, serving as both Vice-President and President. Her favorite subjects to paint are bugs and flowers, and her favorite piece is a box that she designed herself. She loves painting with enamels. Her least favorite subject is birds. She says she can't make them look fluffy.



Glenda Lenz_(Vice-President, APAC)

Glenda first observed a Ceramic Therapy class in 1967, which began her journey and passion with Fired Arts. In 1974, she opened a home studio to teach the techniques she had learned under many local, national, and international artists; and, in 1978, she began teaching Porcelain Art classes at Confederation Park 55+ Centre – a position she held for 42 years. She now holds these same classes at the Go Getters Association at West Hillhurst Community Centre. In addition to teaching, she has judged many art shows, published many of her original works, and taught hundreds of students this beautiful art form. She has been an active member of APAC and Porcelain Artists of Canada for many years and willingly and joyfully shares her knowledge of this Fired Art form with everyone she can. Glenda is the artist who created the theme and scene for Equilibrium's coaster project.

Nancy Beamish

Nancy started painting with her mother at home in Regina, Saskatchewan, and has been painting for over 50 years. Nancy's mother, a member of the International China Painting Teachers Organization (now IPAT), arranged for Nancy to learn under Tory Hallett, a teacher in Calgary. Nancy has been a member of APAC since its inception in 1978, holding the positions of President, Secretary, and Treasurer (sometimes more than once!) over the years. Nancy taught Porcelain Art for over 15 years and enjoys painting flowers most of all. One of her favorite memories was attending a Porcelain Art school in Colorado, where she learned from Wanda Clapham, a renowned porcelain art teacher. Nancy's favorite piece is the Clematis (partly because she has trouble growing them!).

Marj Cherer


Cheryl Snider



Moldova has a nice climate in all seasons. Every season lasts three months.






The famous Moldavian vine is Cricova. The vine is exported to many countries, including Canada, USA, France and others.











Autobiography of Daniel Desfosses – ESL Student

Hello everyone. My name is Daniel Desfosses, I am French-Canadian who was born in Montreal in 1971. I grew up in Montreal. Till I was 11 years old, and then I moved to the countryside north of the city. My dad was a supervisor at the James Bay Hydro Dam and spent his time working away up north. I remember cool picture that he used to send us whit bears, moose, deer, and wolves. They had many wild animals out there.

As I grew older. I had a bad friend having a bad friend led me to make terrible decisions. When I turned 18. I turned it up in jail and I did a third of my time. After this, my now exgirlfriend moved to Alberta, and she asked me to come to Alberta to work. At first, I said no because I was scared. I did not know my English, so it took me a couple of weeks to make the decision to take the plane to come to Alberta.

After I arrived in Alberta, my exgirlfriend and me we traveled from Calgary to Coronation, Alberta, Where I spend 10 Years working rigs. This was extremely difficult because I did not know how to either speak or print English. The most demanding thing to do was school. I had to do my WHMIS, H2S first aid, and TDG and to get my Class 3 license. After 15 years, my English was a little better, so I decided to get my BOP ticket and started drilling on service rigs. I was drilling for a few years when an opportunity was offered to me. The position was rig manager. I was a rig manager for six years.

In the year 2010, I changed professions to be a wireline operator. Then on February 14th, 2019, I hurt myself at work. I got caught in a hydraulic spooler and damaged my left hand. I degloved my middle finger and broke my ring finger to pieces. I have minimum function of my left hand and now I am extremely sensitive to cold. The recovery was extremely difficult, and I am still trying to get better to this day. As I started my recovery while on WCB and Covid- 19 happening at the same time, that has been a huge challenge. The doctor could only give me the minimum treatment for my hand, and that did not work good for me.

So now it is time to decide whether to change the type of job I had. I had little education so WCB decided that it would be a promising idea for me to go back to school, so, my first class was computers, which was very cool.


My teachers Zana Dragicevic was very patient. And for me it was quite easy to learn basic skill programs on the computer, like W, Words. An Excel and Power-Point. I had a small amount of knowledge on computers but needed more skills. And let us not forget that I was petrified of computers. The course helped me out, like to be understanding, to be patient, and to take my time. The class was incredibly fun, creative, and constructive. She took the time to help me on dictation and printing. So, I was more prepared for my next step. On my new journey.

Now it is time for me to learn my English grammar, which is the most petrifying moment for me. Now it was time for me to focus on reading and printing. I started my first course with George Van Bruggen another amazing teacher from the Equilibrium school. As we slowly proceeded, I was having difficulty learning to read. So, we started focusing on reading. After a few months, I noticed I was getting better at reading. And now my focus is to make this my improvement. I matter. Now I do not have to focus on different things, so it's easier to talk about my journey of my new life.


Something that helped me throughout my injury and recovery was the app Tik Tok. It is good to know that people just like me need to smile everyday, and that there are good, positive people out there in this world. The community is formidable. Throughout my journey on Tik Tok, I am particularly good at making videos, editing, and making people laugh. But my one big problem was printing, so it was hard to communicate with people. I decided to start doing live broadcasts, and this helps me gain confidence for my-self. Now, going on two years and 25,876 followers later, I'm still having fun.

've been asked by a colleague to write about poetry and the poetry club. Sadly and quite reliably, she wasn't very specific with her directions, and so I would like to take it upon myself to write about what I think poetry is and why it's important for your development not only as students of the English language, but also as students of the human spirit.

Let's start with a definition. Poetry: "Literary work in which special intensity is given to the expression of feelings and ideas by the use of distinctive style and rhythm; poems collectively or as a genre of literature." Straight from the tome of Ser Google, the end-all be-all of many-a-students' vocabulary query.

And I don't deny this definition. It serves its purpose to define the term quite efficiently. One might say it is a machine-like, well-oiled, and polished definition. Verily functional, indeed.

However, the ball bearings on this definition start to grind when confronted with a truly great poem, a poem that bottles the truth, captures the imagination, or draws forth a tear of empathy, a remembrance of heartbreak, or a burst of joy. When the words shake like an earthquake and shatter like broken glass, when the lines flow like water and crash like waves, the definition of poetry starts to slip.

Sometimes I don't think there is a great definition for poetry. Truth, maybe. The truth we find in the minds and pens of those greatest writers who came before us. The truth of our humanity. The truth of our everyday.

Which makes the study of poetry the study of ourselves.

As students, you may find poetry a good source of vocabulary. You may learn about stress patterns, rhythm and rhyme, comparisons, and many more interesting manipulations of the English language. You can break poems down, do "close readings", where you analyze and interpret them to learn their historical context, grammar, and sentence structure. You can learn about the poet and their reasons for writing the poem and focus your analysis on English and Western culture. You may even connect vocabulary to emotions to better your understanding of the vocabulary itself.


But, if you do so, I believe you miss the point of poetry.


To truly get it, read it. Enjoy it. Savour it. Taste it. Feel it.





Which makes the study of poetry the study of ourselves." So if our students can get to know themselves better, why not provide them with this opportunity.

We wanted students to get creative with what they have learned and since we have had no opportunity to meet in-person for almost two years, this was one way they could make friends develop a sense of community as well as to, use it to improve their skills along the way.

The next question we had was 'can the lower-level students also learn to write poetry'? The answer according to our instructors is, yes! There is no right or wrong in poetry, whether it is free verse, acrostic poems, diamante poems or limericks. There is something for everyone to learn and then use to express themselves. Learning about alliterations, metaphors or allusions may sound very difficult but is actually not, most students already do it in their everyday lives and their native languages, so it's not so hard to catch on to it in English. And yet as one of the instructors pointed out, it is more than just that. The advice; 'To truly get it, read it. Enjoy it. Savour it. Taste it. Feel it.'




Each week the club met on Fridays and students were made familiar with poetry and how to use the language skills they had, to write poems. Our instructors would warm up our students by making them come up with the right vocabulary and then introduced them to the style of poetry for that week. The group would then do one poem together and there was a lot of laughter and fun as they wrote it together.

Poetry Book

One of the really cool things about the club was that every member got a book of poetry by the famous poet Shel Silverstein. The book was chosen by the instructors because it was an award-winning book and the poems by Silverstein (who is also a country musician, playwright, and cartoonist) are easy for everyone to read and enjoy. The book also has beautiful drawings by the author and can be a good talking point for our students and their own children. The teachers thought the families would have something fun to talk about and learn as a group when they recommended the book.

Another Perspective:

As an observer in the club, who also had a few students joining in; I would say that it was a surprise when a number of students showed interest in the poetry club. They tried very hard, not only to learn but also to contribute, a few of them would have doctor's appointments on Fridays, yet they put themselves out there and all of them enjoyed it. Seeing such response made me realize that poetry really is for everyone. This was reflected in the students' reaction, they felt more comfortable and were really feeling the poetry and were in need of a creative outlet. It is my experience, that creative people are better learners as they connect with learning and can express themselves with more confidence. It also created a sense of community and comradeship and in the end, I feel that if even one student's life changed, a little bit for the better, the job has been well done.

January 6th is a special day for some of my LINC students and myself . Christians in Ukraine, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Croatia, and some other countries celebrate Christmas Eve on January 6th. In many other countries this day is known as Epiphany, or Three Kings' Day.

The students had a great time learning about each other's traditions and customs. Olga, Didi Mezgebe, and Lucy made presentations and spoke about the way people celebrate this day in their countries.

Christmas in Ukraine can be celebrated on the 25th of December or on the 7th of January. This is because Orthodox and Greek Catholic churches within Ukraine use the old Julian or the new Gregorian calendars for their church festivals.

The main Christmas meal, called 'Sviata Vecheria' (or Holy Supper) is eaten on Christmas Eve (January 6). Traditionally people fast all day, but you might start the day drinking some holy water that has been blessed at church.

Families usually do not start their 'Sviata Vecheria until the first star is seen in the sky. The star represents the journey of



the three Wise Men to find the newborn Jesus.

The meal normally has 12 dishes which represent Jesus's 12 disciples. Traditionally the dishes don't have any meat, eggs, or milk in them. The main dish is often 'kutia' a kind of sweet porridge made of wheat. Other dishes can include mushrooms, sauerkraut, red 'borsch' (beet soup), dumplings known as 'varenyky' (Pierogi), 'holubtsi' (cabbage rolls, made without meat in them at Christmas!), 'pyrizhky' (cabbage buns), and 'kolach' (special Christmas bread).

After the meal, people love to sing carols or 'Koliadky'. They can be sung around the table, or you might go out caroling

in the streets. People sometimes carry brightly colored stars on poles when they go carol singing.

The Ukrainian carol 'Shchedryk' is known world-wide as 'The Carol of the Bells'.

About half the population of Eritrea are Christians. Many Christmas customs and traditions in Eritrea are similar to those in Ethiopia. Christmas is celebrated on January 7th. People start fasting on the 25th of November and eat only vegan food.

A day or two before Christmas, people start preparing their big Christmas meal. Traditional dishes include injera (a



flatbread made of Teff flour), zigni (a hot meat stew, often made with beef) homemade beer. Many people usually go church services for Christmas. These can start in the evening Christmas Eve or


Latin American and Caribbean countries. The holiday is associated with the traditional Christian feast day of Epiphany when the three wise men brought gifts to the baby Jesus.
