




By Varinder:

By Josephine (Joysi):






My Daughter's Graduation


o test negative | test positive (verb): if you take a test for an infection and you test negative, that means you do not have the infection. If you test positive, that means you have the infection

MY FRUSTRATING

COVID 19 TRAVEL EXPERIENCE

I'm sure many people have had frustrating experiences due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and I wanted to share about one of mine. It started In December 2019, when I got bad news from my brother that my Mom had cancer. I decided to book a ticket to go and see her in New Brunswick. I flew there on February 2, 2020 and spent some time with my Mom at the hospital until she came back home on

February14. Afterwards, my Mother passed away. This was around the time when the Covid-19 pandemic started to badly affect Canada. Due to New Brunswick's Covid-19 restrictions, we could not even have a funeral for my Mom. I also had a terrible time trying to book flights back to my home in Grande Prairie, Alberta. For example, at least 4 flights I had booked with Air Canada were cancelled over a period of five weeks. Fortunately, I was able to say with my brother and sister-in-law in Paquetville, New Brunswick during the entire time. Finally, I was able to book my flight home for May 11th, but only through Halifax International Airport, as flights were not available in New Brunswick. This meant that I would have to travel six hours

and cross the restricted border with Nova Scotia just to get

to the airport!

At 5:00 am, I was already at the Halifax airport waiting to get on the plane. Thankfully, the flight left on time at 6:15 am for Toronto airport. There were very few people on the flight. Since I had a six-hour layover there before catching my flight to Calgary, I went for a walk and did some shopping for my girls. Finally, after many hours of waiting, I boarded my next flight, which left Toronto at 2:00 pm to go to Calgary, Alberta.

The flight to Calgary was long, but it was good. At 4:10 pm., local time, the flight landed in Calgary. I was so happy to be there and to see my girls after 3 months of being away. After we left the airport, we went for supper but had to eat inside the truck, which was not very comfy. We left Calgary around 6:00 pm. to drive to Grande Prairie. By the time we got to Grande-Prairie, it was 1:00 am., and I was so happy to see Grande-Prairie and be home, although I was very tired!

Finaly, I was able to book my flight home for May 11th, but only through Halifax International airport, as flights were not available in New Brunswick.

The day before my flight was to leave, I had to rent a car in Moncton, New Brunswick, to drive six hours to Halifax, Nova Scotia. First, I left Paquetville on May 10 to go to Moncton to get my rental car. Then at 6:00 pm, I left Moncton to drive to Halifax and had to cross the provincial border. At the border, they asked me a ton of questions about why I had to cross into Nova Scotia, but in the end everything was fine. Finally, I arrived at Halifax International Airport around 9:00 pm. I was not allowed to stay in a hotel because I crossed the border and the laws were very strict about self-distancing. I had to spend the whole night in the car because my flight was going to leave at 6:15 am. the next morning and didn't get any sleep at all.

In my opinion, going home at the time of Covid-19 was the worst experience in my life. Still, I have no regrets because I was so happy to spend lots of time with my mom before she died. However, I'm sure I am not ready to go back again to New Brunswick any time soon with that experience I had.






My Family and Friends-by Williams


- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped, optional
- 2 cans (19 oz./540 mL) diced tomatoes
- 1 can (14 oz./398 mL) red kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 2 tbsp. chili powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground pepper

In a large frypan, brown beef. Drain off excess fat. Add onion, green pepper and garlic; sauté until vegetables are tender, about 7 minutes. Add remaining ingredients (tomatoes through pepper).

Bring to a boil; reduce heat, cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 1 hour. Serves 4.










ANCIENT STRUCTURES IN BOSRA, SYRIA -By Asad - ESL

prosperity, peace, and unity. Besides, all the people were equal. It is believed that his spirit will come to visit his people once every year.


Keralites really want to make him happy during


The Cali Fair usually starts on December 25th and ends on January 6th. This carnival focuses on a celebration of salsa music and dance.





Eba – Caaccu from Oromo

Eba is holding a caaccu from his culture. It is made from beads. Women carry it and sometimes put fresh butter or oil inside it.



Cynthia – souvenirs from the Philippines

Harpeet is showing a traditional shawl from India. Women wear these in many colours and materials.






Chaouki – currency, flag and accessory from Lebanon and family photo $% \left(\mathbf{r}\right) =\mathbf{r}^{\prime }$




