


Have you ever heard about the Republic of Moldova? Today I would like to introduce to you this fabulous beautifully country.


At that time, Moldova was an undefeatable, united country which had won 42 wars against the Turkish Empire.


#### **Jediyo Mohamed**




#### Hailu

I spent most of the Family Day weekend in Sooke, BC visiting my favourite cousin Maja and her family. I love visiting Maja and usually visit every November for her son's birthday.

However, this time it was for a sad occasion – my uncle (Maja's dad) had passed away and I was traveling there to attend the funeral. She asked me to speak at the funeral on behalf of my family, as my father was unable to make the trip (he is 90 and his health is good but it's not easy for him to travel). Here is what I said:

I am Maja's cousin, but you might notice the strong family resemblance between us. We are "double cousins" and are more like sisters than cousins...let me explain:

Helge was my dad's brother (normal, right?) but... he was married to my mother's sister [my aunt passed away Dec. 2019]. So...two Danish brothers married two Japanese sisters. My parents have never given me the full story of how they



met, and I have stopped asking, but I do know that my uncle and aunt met because they were both staying with my parents at our house in Calgary. My uncle wanted an adventure, so he came to Calgary to visit my dad. A few years later, after I was born, my aunt Shigeko (my mom's sister) came to Calgary, to visit and perhaps help my mom raising two little girls. I guess my aunt met my uncle and...they fell in love and were married 6 years to the day after my parents. When I look through old photo albums, I can see that right from the start they spent a lot of time together and went on many vacations together. They travelled all over Alberta and BC in a blue station wagon - camping, fishing, hiking and sightseeing. I treasure these photos as I can see how happy they were and what great experiences they must have had in their new country. I'm sure it was nice for these 4 people from two totally different countries/cultures to have one another for support and companionship.

Growing up, we spent pretty much every holiday and special occasion with my aunt, uncle and my two cousins who came along in 1972 and 1973. They say cousins are your "first best friends" and I would say in my case that is true. Because of our similar upbringings with immigrant parents from the same countries, we were brought up with the same values, customs and traditions. For example, while most Canadians celebrate Christmas on December 25, we always celebrate on December 24 because that is the Danish way. It was always fun and special to spend it together.

Helge would say that he was my favourite uncle (and that he was also my most

handsome uncle); in fact, he is the only uncle I ever really knew because our other relatives live overseas. My uncle was always joking around and looking for someone to chat with. He was the opposite of my father, who is quiet, rather shy and serious. Even though they were so different, whenever they got together, they would fall into their familiar relationship and just chat easily.

By the way, when I was little, I thought our family relationship was normal, so for many years I assumed I would marry the brother of whoever my sister married. I was somewhat concerned about this because what if her husband didn't have a brother, or what if I didn't like him? Luckily...that wasn't the case!

I was lucky to see my uncle in November 2023 when he was still jolly and mobile. He had been suffering from cancer for several years but according to my cousin, he never complained and was always in good spirits. My sister, who lives in Colorado, was able to see him a few weeks before he passed away. I asked her if she wanted to share some words about him, and not surprisingly, her memories are much the same as mine. She told me something that he said to her, and I would like to end with this, as it really sums up his personality:


his fight. I heard last year that a black man was killed by a white police officer. It was wrong and I don't want to hear that in my life. We are all children of God.

# WORD OF THE DAY

"yammer" - to talk continuously and often in a complaining or whining manner, usually about trivial manners e.g. During the meeting, he continued to yammer about the office temperature instead of focusing on the agenda.

"lethargic" - feeling sluggish, lacking energy, or being slow-moving and inactive

e.g. After the long hike, she felt lethargic and just wanted to rest for the rest of the day.

"equalizer" - something that promotes, creates, or restores equality or fairness, especially in a competitive situation

e.g.: In sports, a strong defense can serve as an equalizer even against a more skilled opponent.

# The Kananaskis Conservation Pass

The Kananaskis Conversation Pass is a permit required for visitors to access certain areas within Kananaskis Country in Alberta, Canada. Implemented by the Government of Alberta, the pass system aims to generate revenue to support the maintenance and conservation efforts in the region, which is a popular outdoor recreation destination.

As of the latest update, visitors are required to purchase a pass to access Kananaskis Country for activities such as hiking, skiing, camping, and sightseeing. The pass can be purchased online through the Alberta Parks website or at various vendors throughout the province. There are different pass options available, including daily and annual passes, with varying fees depending on factors such as residency status and vehicle type.

Revenue generated from the sale of these passes goes towards maintaining trails, facilities, and infrastructure within Kananaskis Country, as well as supporting conservation initiatives and environmental protection efforts in the area. It's important for visitors to familiarize themselves with the regulations and requirements regarding the Kananaskis Conservation Pass before planning their trip to ensure compliance and contribute to the preservation of this beautiful natural area.

#### Cost

Only one pass per personal or commercial passenger vehicle is required. There is no extra cost for trailers or additional passengers. Pass purchases are non-transferable to another vehicle.



# **MY LIFE STORY**

Profile: Daniel (Mel) Davison

I am currently in a Customized English program through Equilibrium School. I was asked by my English Instructor, George, if I would be willing to share a bit about my life story. My story is about living as an orphan and someone who was often rejected and abused. At 18 months of age, I was removed from the "native" system and placed into the "white" system by the government. I was left to fend for myself when I became 18 years of age. There have been a lot of difficulties in my life, but I have survived and overcome many of them and am living a successful life.


I am Indigenous (First Nations Mi'kmaq Nation), of the people who were the original inhabitants of Nova Scotia. I was subjected to the Canadian foster child system throughout my childhood. I was born in a Nova Scotia hospital that had an orphanage attached to it and lived the first 18 months of my life there. When the government took me out of the 'native system' and put me in the 'white system', my childhood was very difficult within both my home and school environments, where I was degraded and never accepted. I endured the abuse of the white schooling system through the "60s Scoop" [1964] movement. I was placed and removed from various foster homes 7 times. Throughout that time, I was physically and sexually abused. I was also tied up, shot, and left to die, but I survived. I even walked the streets of Prince Rupert as a homeless child of only 8 years old.

Despite all the difficulties I have encountered, I have persevered and been successful in many areas of my life. I have traveled across Canada, from the Maritimes to British Columbia and back again and went through many different experiences. I have worked at many different jobs in the Maritimes, B.C., and the Prairies. For example, I worked on an offshore oil rig near Sable Island, Nova Scotia, and saw lots of wildlife in the ocean as well as on the shore of the island. I have a photographic memory and, despite my limited educational opportunities, am qualified to work with robotics, automation, and electronics. Also, I have restored vintage vehicles, built many things out of wood and metal, and am an arborist (tree expert). I also play several instruments, own my home in Red Deer, Alberta, and love to grow flowers in my garden. I'm also proud to say that I don't drink alcohol. I have

persevered and triumphed over the difficulties I've had in my life, although, of course, I still have problems like anyone else.


George is enthusiastic about my plan to write my life story and have it published. We're now in the process of contacting potential Indigenous authors, journalists, and editors to ask for assistance in writing my book. My goal and dream is that my book, when it is published, will bring more awareness to the tragedies and abuses that so many generations of First Nations, Inuit, and Metis people suffered through their unwilling participation in more than 130 residential schools across Canada, from when the first opened in 1831 until the last closed in 1996.

Thank you for reading my story. Some day soon, maybe you'll read my book when it is published, which I hope will help educate everyone about the tragic history of the Canadian Residential School system and what the government and religious several denominations did to diminish and extinguish the lives of 150,000+ people for over 150 years. The abuses many Indigenous people suffered should never be forgotten so that it will never happen again!

Equilibrium School's Specialized Language Acquisition for Vocational Achievement (SLAVA) in Alberta Program will provide the linguistic tools needed to navigate the sociocultural aspects of workplace language in Alberta. This includes workplace etiquette, formal and informal workplace writing, communicating with colleagues and clients, understanding directions and instructions, as well as commonly used Alberta workplace language. The course is designed for employed and/or employment-ready individuals who have either completed LINC in Canada, or have already acquired an English language foundation of at least CLB 3 in all skills. The primary function of this course is to prepare individuals with moderate English language abilities for challenges in the Alberta workplace that often stem from sociocultural factors that are not taught in a conventional EAL classroom.
